How will the University communicate with me to provide latest advice, protocols and decisions information updates, advice, protocols and decisions?

I have a problem with my new assignments - who do I speak to?

If you have a problem with an assignment, please contact the Module Lecturer or your Programme / Course Coordinator to discuss your concerns.

How can I make up my missing work placement hours?

Placements in Early Childhood Education and Social Care settings have been cancelled along with any that take place in HSE facilities. Students with a deficit of hours to make up, can do so later this year. More information about this will be communicated to students affected once the necessary arrangements have been made.

How can I make up missing labs that are core to my module?

If the labs you have missed are core to the learning objectives of your module, your Lecturer or Programme/Course Coordinator will communicate to you how you can make up the work once the necessary arrangements have been made.

Will we have Semester Two exams?

The University will not hold the usual, face to face, invigilated examinations this semester. Alternative assessment formats have been developed and these have been communicated directly to students.

I am a final-year student; how will the closure affect my degree?

The University has worked to develop alternative assessments that maintain the appropriate quality assurance and approval mechanisms that are required to ensure students can move on in their studies and that their final qualification meets the expectations of professional bodies, employers and other academic institutions. These arrangements have been communicated to students.

Can I get additional time /extension on my thesis?

If you believe you may need more time to complete your thesis, please contact your Programme/Course Chair or Lecturer.

I am an Apprentice student, what will happen with my exams?

It is not possible for Phase 4 and 6 apprentice students to complete their exams as planned so these have been deferred to take place at a later date. Given the fluid nature of the public health situation, SOLAS is not in a position to advise apprentices of any new examination dates.

All apprentices have been notified of their Term Three start date. However, given the current public health situation, it may be necessary to adjust this date or to defer the blocks. Further discussions will be required between SOLAS, DES and HEA on this matter, and will be based upon the most up-to-date advice from the authorities on the public health situation.

I am an apprentice, what is happening with off-the-job training?

Further to the temporary closure of educational institutions announced on the 12 March 2020, and ongoing developments in relation to COVID-19, Phase 4 and Phase 6 training which had been due to commence on the 6 April 2020 has now been postponed. Craft apprentices who were due to commence off-the-job training should remain with their employer until training is rescheduled for a later date.

Do you expect that lectures will restart this semester? / Are face-to-face lecturers cancelled for this year?

For the moment, TU Dublin campus buildings are closed for all face-to-face educational activity but TU Dublin is working to ensure that students are supported during the rest of the academic year and that assessments can take place.

I don't have access to a computer or laptop due to the college being closed. What should I do for my assignments/dissertation/project?

If you do not have access to a computer, please contact your Course Coordinator to find out what alternative arrangements can be made.

What do I do if there is software that I need for my laptop, which is only available on a computer in the college that I need to use?

If you do not have access to specific software, please contact your Programme / Course Coordinator to find out what alternative arrangements can be made.

I have lost my job, and I can't afford to buy the parts to build my final-year project now. Can I get an extension?

If you do not have the funds to purchase materials for a project, please contact your Programme Coordinator to discuss an extension or alternative arrangements.

For anyone who has lost their job due to Covid-19, the Department of Employment Affairs and Social Protection has introduced a pandemic payment, for which you may qualify. Is the Maths Learning Centre still available for students?

Due to closure of the university buildings to students the Mathematics Learning Support Centre (MLSC - City) drop-in centres are currently closed. However, the MLSC continues to offer a significant amount of online self-study material. Topics covered in these resources include: Preliminary Concepts (indices, fractions, logarithms, etc.), Equations (rearranging and solving equations), Functions and Calculus, Matrices and Vectors, Trigonometry and Introductory Statistics.

Are there any travel restrictions in place in Ireland?

The Irish Government is taking a cautious approach to international travel and non-essential travel is not advised until at least 20 July 2020. On that date, a so-called "green list" of countries with similar levels of the virus to Ireland will be published. That will be followed by an easing of travel restrictions between those countries and Ireland.

What do I have to do on entering Ireland from abroad?

The Irish Authorities require anyone coming into Ireland, apart from Northern Ireland, to self-isolate for 14 days. Passengers arriving to Ireland from overseas are obliged to complete a mandatory [Public Health Passenger Locator Form](#) and to submit it to the relevant authority at their port of entry. This includes Irish residents. Check the [Irish Government Advice Page](#) for full information on these requirements.
