Part 3 Programme background/structure

Background

The programme is aimed at providing a foundation in both the practice and theory of journalism. It ranges from the basics of journalistic craft to consideration of the part that journalists play in society. Although it aims to train students in the essential skills of journalism, it is an MA programme in which students need to reflect critically on their journalistic work and on journalism in general. The programme includes tuition, practical experience, a wide range of assignments, seminars, tutorials, independent study and research.

The programme has been running since 1998. It is being reviewed in the light of the changing journalism industry. The Review Panel initially visited the School of Media in 2019 and recommended approval for one more intake while the programme team completed a root and branch review of the programme that involved consultation and engagement with industry and relevant other stakeholders to ensure the best outcomes for students and that graduates are future proofed for a career in journalism, i.e. that the programme should be more relevant for contemporary journalism practice

Stated aim and learning outcomes of the programme

Purpose	The aim of this programme is to provide students with the knowledge, skills, resilience, values and competences required to work as a journalist having undergone a conversion programme from their primary degree. It is a multi-purpose award type in which the expertise and skills acquired by graduates will contribute to their personal development, their employability, as well as their potential to contribute to society. Successful completion of this programme also offers a pathway for post-graduate students to advance to higher level training and education.
Learning outcomes	The programme aims to generate a range of learning outcomes in terms of knowledge, know-how, skill and competence. On successful completion of this programme students should be able to demonstrate the following:
Knowledge – breadth	 Work as a professional journalist, able to produce high quality news and features, across all media and socio-cultural contexts, be able to edit for print, broadcast or internet, and tell stories for a variety of print and internet publications and outlets. Show an awareness of the value of accurate and in-depth research, and the importance of communicating findings accurately in your work, respecting the importance of correct sourcing, fact checking and referencing. Understand, evaluate and incorporate the legal framework surrounding journalism production and understand the ethical issues relating to media. Have an in-depth understanding of the concepts, theories and models pertaining to the study and practice of journalism, its application, as well as the theoretical grounding of the discipline.
Knowledge – kind	 Have a good understanding of core journalism principles and practice both older forms and emerging forms of journalism which are essential regardless of the medium. Have critical awareness of the politics of information and informational technologies as both citizens and trustees of journalism practice. Be able to compare the development, present and future of Journalism on a transnational and cross-cultural basis.
Know how & skill - range	 Research and assess facts, concepts, underlying values, and theories from a wide variety of sources and be able to use this

- research to produce journalism and well researched knowledge in various formats, as well as multi-media work while employing professional judgement, rigour and discipline when doing so.
- Research and analyse all the potential sources available to journalists.
- Work constructively individually and collaboratively with fellow members of a team when producing joint projects for coursework and student publications, such as newspapers, magazines, online news platforms and broadcasts, of professional quality and to a deadline.
- Produce responsible solutions to ethical problems that arise in media and journalism practice.
- Take responsibility for work, individually and in team settings.
- Write engaging, concise, well-constructed copy for publications, both print and internet, and produce professional standard broadcast or multi-media packages for target audiences.
- Edit journalistic material and design print and internet publications to a high professional standard.
- Manage time and information constructively and solve practical problems quickly and effectively.
- Research topics relating to ethical and historical journalistic issues, analyse data, draw conclusions and present them in essays, as well as orally.
- Be aware of the legal environments and constraints on media and journalism
- Be able to confidently engage in discussions of and critiques of journalism practice.
- Analyse and critique the evolving media environment from a political and social perspective to understand the constant negotiation and tension between private and public value in Journalism
- Display an ability to identify, communicate and engage effectively with the breadth of roles involved in producing journalism.

Know how & skill – selectivity

- An ability to plan and implement journalistic projects in a manner that is time efficient.
- An ability to apply journalistic techniques to solving real world problems.
- Identify development opportunities regarding journalism.
- Ability to combine practical and theoretical knowledge and practical skills to innovate in Journalism across media and platforms.
- Understand the institutional evolutional of Journalism which now stretches beyond the newsroom and across the digital media ecosystem.

Programme structure

The programme is offered as a full-time programme, lasting from late September to September of the following year. Commencing in the second semester and continuing over the summer, students complete a dissertation or landmark journalism project of 15 ECTS. The programme is divided into three strands: Practical Journalism, Journalism Studies and Professional Journalism. Students undertake a placement in semester two or over the summer months.

Entry Requirements (

Minimum entry requirements for this programme is an honours 2.2 degree or its equivalent in any relevant discipline. Selection may be made by interview and evidence of the following is sought:

Academic achievement in relevant disciplines; relevant professional experience; evidence of specific aptitude, ability and potential in journalism; evidence of commitment to a career in journalism; interest in and critical awareness of the role of media in society; evidence of interest in postgraduate media research.

Candidates with significant work experience but without the requisite qualifications may be considered under Recognition of Prior Learning.

The School of Media welcomes applications from international applicants. The IELTS requirement for the MAJ is 7.5.

Part 6 Recommendations of the Panel

The Panel is pleased to recommend continuing approval of the Master of Arts in Journalism, at Level Nine on the National Framework of Qualifications, subject to two conditions and with three recommendations.

The Panel is impressed with the work undertaken by the Programme Team since the last meeting of the Panel in 2019. It is evident that a significant review has taken place, both in the revised programme documentation and during the Panel's meeting with staff. The involvement of industry in this redesign is commended. The Panel considers that this revised programme, which will from September 2021 be delivered in the new space and facilities available in Grangegorman, will be very attractive to potential journalism students.

Conditions

- Students' access to dissertation/project supervision up to the point of final submission should be clarified, and the School should consider how this will be supported.
- Reading lists should be updated to make sure that they include the most current texts. In relevant modules the Programme Team should consider some additional material relevant to diversity matters, reflective of diversity in all its aspects.

Recommendations

- The Programme Team should consider holding additional news days in semester one, recommending that they should be introduced in semester one at an early stage and they should replicate as much as possible the authentic news day experience.
- Relevant handbooks and other programme materials should reflect more accurately how the Programme Team supports students in finding appropriate placements, while encouraging students to explore their own placement options. The Panel considered this a particular strength of the programme that should be highlighted.
- The Programme Team ensure that there is adequate coverage of public affairs/institutions
 within appropriate modules and that this should be made explicit within relevant module
 descriptors in the indicative syllabus and reading lists.
