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#### **TU Dublin SDG Impact Progress Report 2022**

The vision for TU Dublin Strategic Intent 2030 is to 'Create a Better World, Together'. In developing our TU Dublin strategy, and over the course of our conversations with over 2,500 stakeholders, we viewed the challenges facing us through the lens of the UN Sustainability Goals (SDGs). Some clear areas of focus emerged which resulted in shaping our plan to tackle our task through the following themes - People, Planet, Partnership and underpinned by the key SDG goal of 'Quality Education'. These pillars inform our approach to educational, research and engagement practices, ensuring that TU Dublin delivers real change, innovation and impact for society.

This is TU Dublin's third report on how the University has been addressing the SDGs. It includes examples of initiatives, events and project work that are having an impact across the 17 SDGs.





### TU Dublin SDG 1: No Poverty

Year	Event
Nov 2022	TU Dublin Community Development worked in partnership with Afri (Action from Ireland) and students from Year 3
	Youth Work to host the Afri Hedge School 2022 event. The theme for the event was 'Protecting Human Rights in a time
	of crisis: War & Displacement (Ukraine) Housing/Accommodation & Cost of Living (Ireland)'.
October 2022	TU Dublin and Giving Ireland announced a research scholarship programme focusing on philanthropy. This research
	programme will investigate how nonprofits are impacted by the culture of giving and donating in Ireland.
September 2022	In conjunction with the Department of Further & Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science (DFHERIS), TU
	Dublin provided 600 places under the Springboard initiative, which supports people who are unemployed, previously
	self-employed or returning to work. These programmes are provided free or subsidized.
September 2022	In Ireland, 13.5% of the population has a disability (CSO 2016 census). However, Ireland has one of the lowest
	employment rates (26.2%) for people with disabilities in the European Union, meaning this group is at a greater risk of
	poverty than the wider population. In response, TU Dublin delivered an online programme Self-employment for People
	with Disabilities that addresses the distinctive challenges facing people with disabilities in becoming self-employed and
	raising awareness of the benefits of self-employment.
August 2022	In August, a new four-day programme <u>LEVEL-UP for Access</u> was introduced to support those interested in returning to
	education or continuing their education in college but were usure where to start. The programme was managed by the
	TU Dublin Access Service which was established to assist individuals and communities in overcoming socio-economic
	barriers to accessing higher education.
July 2022	In Summer 2022, the Exceptional Services Fund was introduced to help TU Dublin students who cannot access
	traditional funding. It provides assistance to those experiencing extreme and immediate financial difficulty. The fund is
	supported by the TU Dublin Foundation <u>Giving to the University</u> programme.



June 2022	Five members of the School of Transport, Engineering, Environment and Planning at TU Dublin presented to the Joint
	Committee on Housing, Local Government and Heritage on ways of regenerating urban centers by bringing derelict or
	vacant properties back into use, including for social and affordable housing.
May 2022	TU Dublin Graduate Business School alumni gathered to brainstorm fundraising solutions for the Dublin Simon
	Community. Led by TU Dublin GROWTHhub, the Dublin Simon Community Alumni Ideation Challenge was the first in
	what will become a regular feature of the TU Dublin alumni calendar. Across the day, the Graduate Business School
	alumni explored and designed potential solutions for specific fundraising challenges faced by Dublin Simon Community,
	particularly in the post-pandemic context where engagement with donors has been impacted.
Ongoing	Our TU Dublin Access Foundation Programme is a one-year full-time course, preparing students both personally and
	academically, to pursue undergraduate programmes at TU Dublin. The programme forms part of TU Dublin's
	commitment to extending access to education to people from communities lacking a strong tradition of participation in
	third-level education. The <u>TU Dublin HEAR Scheme</u> also enables school-leavers from socio-economically disadvantaged
	backgrounds to apply for full-time undergraduate programmes at TU Dublin.
Ongoing	TU Dublin Financial Aid, in conjunction with the Government of Ireland provides financial support to full or part-time
	students who are experiencing financial difficulties while attending college. It includes:

	SUSI grants
	Funds for Students with Disabilities
Ongoing	TU Dublin Academic Supports offers additional support in mathematics, writing and grinds to ensure that all students
	have the best opportunity to graduate.
Ongoing	The Area Based Childhood Programme (ABC) at TU Dublin is an early intervention programme for children aged 0-6 and
	their families. It aims to work in partnership with families, practitioners, communities, and national stakeholders to
	deliver better outcomes for children and families living in areas where poverty is most deeply entrenched.
Ongoing	The Grangegorman Labour and Learning Forum (GLLF) works closely with TU Dublin and other partners to promote <u>Life</u>
	Long Learning with access to education and training, particularly for 'non-traditional' learners. The primary aim is to
	work with partners to address barriers to access to learning, identify gaps in adult and continuing education and
	training provision.

October 2022	Irish Research Council announced funding for 17 TU Dublin Researchers. Successful TU Dublin awardees included Luana
	De Souza Cavalcante Carnaval for research on Multifunctional Smart Edible Coatings for Sustainable Food Industry
	Application (SmartEdibleCoat).
October 2022	The President of TU Dublin invited students to a <u>Sustainability Innovation Challenge</u> . The hackathon event involved
	brainstorming ideas to positively impact on reducing food waste, which is a global problem. The prize fund was €2,000.
September 2022	TU Dublin's Leaf No Waste celebrated their success in securing the SFI Food Challenge Prize. They were part of the
	winning team for the SFI Future Innovator Prize, which was valued at €2m. This builds upon their earlier successes
	during the Concept and Seed phase in 2021.
September 2022	TU Dublin lecturer, Dr Anushree Priyadarshini, lead the project FORWARD, which quantified the food waste generated
	by Irish households. It received funding under the Irish Research Council's Collaborative Alliances for Societal
	Challenges (COALESCE) programme.
September 2022	TU Dublin Innovation Partners Pearson Milking Technology and Micron Agritech won Enterprise Ireland's Innovation
	Arena Awards 2022. The 'Bullseye' invention drives innovation through automation and delivers benefits to farms as it
	frees up resources, improves overall outputs and increases efficiencies, contributing to sustained food production and
	addressing the challenge of labour shortages on farms.
June 2022	A research project led by TU Dublin and Queens University Belfast funded by Safefood, looking at the cost of living with
	a food allergy or coeliac disease in Ireland has estimated that the average cost burden for a child with a food allergy is
	€1,439 every year, rising to €1,602 for an adult.
March 2022	TU Dublin Green Week is an annual celebration of innovation and partnerships to promote sustainability. This year's
	schedule of events provided opportunities to debate ideas and showcase a living lab for environmental sustainability.

Ongoing	One of TU Dublin's canteen suppliers Aramark commits to reduce food loss and waste by 50% by 2030 in all its

Ongoing	TU Dublin contracted a new catering organisation, Sodexo, whose 2025 Corporate Citizen Goal is to reduce food waste
	by 50% and have 100 million Stop Hunger beneficiaries.





# TU Dublin SDG 3: Good Health & Wellbeing

Year	Event
December 2022	TU Dublin Sports facilities in Grangegorman and Broombridge won two 'Outstanding Awards' for the National Quality Standard (NQS) from Ireland Active, the governing body for Sports & Leisure Facilities in Ireland.
November 2022	TU Dublin announced its Sports Scholars for the 2022/23 academic year. 79 student-athletes were honoured and formally awarded a place on the University's Athlete Sports Programme.
October 2022	Taking place over two days, the second annual <u>Health Hackathon</u> brought together over 40 students from across TU Dublin, with students asked to develop solutions for five challenges set by Tallaght University Hospital (TUH) clinicians.
October 2022	The Irish Research Council announced €27m in funding for new research projects under the Irish Research Council's flagship Government of Ireland programmes, including awards for 17 TU Dublin researchers. Awardees conducted research on a multitude of topics including research on "Explainable Artificial Intelligence in Smart Healthcare Applications: Focusing on Healthcare Decisions Support Systems".
September 2022	TU Dublin launched a <u>Digital Skills Diagnostic tool</u> for students and staff. This was an opportunity to evaluate skills across 15 key areas of digital capability including digital wellbeing.
September 2022	TU Dublin hosted the Walk 21 global conference bringing together over 500 delegates and an incredible speaker line-up of over 60 experts, including practitioners, academics, planners, politicians and citizens, to celebrate the importance of walking and to re-imagine a world that is more livable and sustainable.



September 2022	TU Dublin's <u>Human Factors in Safety &amp; Sustainability (HFISS)</u> research group organised the <u>European Safety and Reliability conference (ESREL)</u> . The Conference was hosted at TU Dublin for five days which included intense exchange on scientific research and industry practices on the various themes underpinned by this year's title: "Understanding and Managing Risk and Reliability for a Sustainable Future".
September 2022	A TU Dublin Product Design student created a revolutionary device with the potential to significantly <u>reduce the incidence of Repetitive Strain Injury (RSI)</u> amongst healthcare professionals.
July 2022	TU Dublin engaged in national dialogue on the future of research in Ireland that has culminated in the <u>Creating Our Future</u> Report published by the Minister, Simon Harris. <i>Creating our Future</i> is a unique national brainstorm that received more than 18,000 ideas on how to create a better society. The diverse breadth of public submissions on where research should be focused ranged from ideas on the environment, mental health, food and sustainable and green living, to housing, health, the arts, digital challenges, learning and development, and nurturing community.
June 2022	New research, funded by Safefood and led by TU Dublin and Queens University Belfast, looked at the cost of living with a food allergy or coeliac disease in Ireland and has estimated that the average cost burden for a child with a food allergy is €1,439 every year, rising to €1,602 for an adult.
June 2022	To support health and well-being, TU Dublin launched a part time course in <u>BSc in Sports Studies</u> . The course integrates Sport Science, Coaching Science and Sports Administration and Governance.
June 2022	Global healthcare company Wassenburg Medical Ireland has invested €280,000 in a healthcare-driven innovation partnership with TU Dublin to establish a state-of-the-art Medical Device Decontamination facility (MDD-Hub) on the University's flagship campus in Grangegorman.
May 2022	TU Dublin researchers from the <i>School of Electrical &amp; Electronic Engineering</i> presented their e-learning materials at a meeting of the <u>Hands-On SHAFE (Smart Healthy Age-Friendly Environments)</u> project in Warsaw. It was an ERASMUS funded project that emphasised the use of technology, the importance of health and wellness, and the design of places to support independent living.
April 2022	TU Dublin launched a new Virtual Reality (VR) Training programme in conjunction with BioPharmaChem Skillnet. This programme was developed for the Pharma Industry and provides training in Powder Handling for Pharmaceutical Manufacturing.
March 2022	Research from the <u>ADAPT SFI Research Centre for Al-Driven Digital Content Technology</u> at TU Dublin led to novel prediction models, which are more accurate at identifying people with a high risk of stroke under the age of 60 who may not be identified using a traditional stroke risk prediction model.



March 2022	The Health Research Board (HRB) awarded TU Dublin with funding for the <a href="SPHeRE Programme">SPHeRE Programme</a> , to drive research into addressing Ireland's emerging health and social care challenges.
March 2022	TU Dublin partnered with Tallaght University Hospital to develop an app to empower patients with chronic pancreatitis to take control of their condition. The <a href="SmartCP App">SmartCP App</a> will also improve communication with the hospital team.
November 2021	TU Dublin and Ocumetra received the <u>People's Choice Award</u> , an accolade bestowed by <i>Knowledge Transfer Ireland</i> (KTI). The KTI Impact Awards celebrate the work of the Higher Education Innovation Offices around the country and their role in helping transform academic research into commercial impact.
Ongoing	TU Dublin actively supports women's health and wellbeing through the <u>Developing Women Through Sport Programme</u> , which inspires and empowers women to become sports coaches and leaders.
Ongoing	TU Dublin Active Retirement Association was set up and is managed by the retired members of staff of the University. The Association supports the health and well-being of retirees.
Ongoing	TU Dublin offers a series of Workplace Wellbeing webinars to support the health and well-being of staff.
Ongoing	TU Dublin's <u>People Development</u> programmes provides a variety of initiatives to support the personal and professional development of staff of the University.
Ongoing	TU Dublin has a <u>Student Dignity and Respect policy</u> in place.
Ongoing	The Safety, Health and Welfare (SHW) Office at TU Dublin, promotes a culture of health and safety throughout the university, including in the conduct of research.
Ongoing	TU Dublin offers fitness & sports facilities to students and staff.
Ongoing	TU Dublin <u>Healthy Campus</u> creates a culture that supports healthy choices and lifestyles.
Ongoing	Improving the health and well-being of the population is core to the TU Dublin Environmental Sustainability and Health Institute (ESHI). This research cluster seeks to inform and shape health policy and serve as a critical interface in linking scientific, technical and research knowledge with action to improve population health & health services.

Dec 2022	TU Dublin was delighted to welcome an announcement by the Minister, Simon Harris T.D., that Bundle One of the
	Higher Education Public Private Partnership (PPP) Programme has reached financial close and will deliver two state-of-
	the-art educational facilities on the University's Blanchardstown and Tallaght campuses.
Dec 2022	Walls Construction, a leading Irish-owned construction company, announced it will support Design + Construct,
	Ireland's first Centre of Excellence for Architecture, Construction and Engineering (AEC) education and research from
	TU Dublin. Building on over a century of delivering education for the AEC sector, Design + Construct will leverage TU

	the Signing of the Magna Charta in Bologna. The Magna Charta Universitatum, first signed in 1988 and revised in 2020
	to reflect changes in the world faced by universities, continues to underpin the mission and operations of universities
	everywhere.
Oct 2022	The Central Quad in Grangegorman was shortlisted for the World Architecture Festival Awards, which took place in
	Lisbon from 30 November to 2 December.
Oct 2022	TU Dublin and Huawei Ireland launched the 2022/2023 <u>Tech4Her Scholarships</u> . Female students in STEM courses across
	TU Dublin were eligible to apply.
Oct 2022	Entrepreneurship Project Inno-EUt+, a complementary project of the European University of Technology (EUt+), which
	aims to increase the innovation and entrepreneurship capacity of seven EUt+ partners, including TU Dublin, announced
	its first-year results. The €1.2 million project aims to provide formal and informal, inclusive entrepreneurship
	education programmes that will enable universities to inspire, mentor, and support aspiring entrepreneurs among a

Feb 2022	As part of the new Grangegorman Campus development project, TU Dublin is building a <u>new state-of-the-art Academic</u>
	Hub and library. In February the new contractors for this development were announced. The Academic Hub will be
	visually unique, incorporating the existing North House building, which dates from 1854, into a new, modern structure
	that will wrap around the historical site complimenting and enhancing it.

December 2022	TU Dublin published its first Gender Pay Gap Report
November 2022	TU Dublin student won a bursary, promoting <u>Diversity in Engineering</u> , from the Kirby Group.
October 2022	TU Dublin and Bainne Beatha launched a landmark report, 'Breastfeeding support in Ireland: a national study'.
October 2022	TU Dublin was delighted to work with Huawei Ireland for the 2022/2023 <u>Tech4Her Scholarships</u> . Female students in STEM courses across TU Dublin
September 2022	The School of Mathematics and Statistics became the first School to be awarded an <u>Athena Swan Bronze Award</u> at TU Dublin for its commitment to gender equality.
May 2022	TU Dublin was <u>awarded funding</u> through Science Foundation Ireland (SFI) to support frontier research. In line with SFI's gender strategy, the programme seeks to provide opportunities to address gender imbalance and to provide support for investigators returning to research after a period of leave.
May 2022	CSinc (Computer Science Inclusive) is a research group with a computer science education focus. In May, CSinc hosted a Coding Day for 130 Young Women on campus. It was the first of these large events on campus since the pandemic.
May 2022	The WITU (Women in Technology United) Network in TU Dublin welcomed young women considering a career in engineering to TU Dublin to support gender diversity in technology courses.
May 2022	The Schools of Mathematics and Computer Science at TU Dublin held their annual <u>ICT Summer Camp</u> for second level schools, promoting female participation in Computing.
March 2022	TU Dublin is proud to have received an <u>Athena SWAN Bronze Award</u> . The Athena SWAN charter is an international framework which supports higher education to monitor and transform gender equality.



March 2022	The Athena SWAN Action Plan 2022-2025 was launched with agreed goals, priority actions and timelines. It was
	launched by the <u>Directorate of Equality, Diversity and Inclusion</u> and as part of our Strategic Intent 2030 to 'Being
	recognised as an exemplar in equality, diversity and inclusion (EDI)'.
March 2022	As part of International Women's Day, TU Dublin held a <u>campaign to raise awareness against bias</u> and celebrate
	women's achievements.
March 2022	TU Dublin celebrated International Women's Day with the launch of the WE Support Panel Series, which aims to
	empower women in entrepreneurship.
Ongoing	TU Dublin is coordinating an international research project, SellSTEM (Spatially Enhanced Learning Linked to STEM),
	which was awarded €4.12M in funding and aims to enhance the spatial ability of young people and to help close the
	gender gap in STEM.
Ongoing	Researchers from TU Dublin tackle online child sexual exploitation and abuse through innovative research under the
	Technology Coalition Safe Online Research Fund
Ongoing	Researchers from the School of Computer Science at TU Dublin received funding from the HEA's Gender Equality

Ongoing	TU Dublin Equality Statement was formally approved in 2019, having been informed by the UN Sustainable
	Development Goals (including SDG 5), ensuring our commitment to diversity and social mix, advancing gender equality
	and eliminating discrimination.
Ongoing	TU Dublin provides mentorship programmes - <u>ESTEME</u> and <u>SAER Mentoring programme</u> - to address gender equality in
	the fields of Engineering and Computing
Ongoing	TU Dublin renewed its efforts to increase the participation of women in craft apprenticeships. Women make up less
	than 1% of registered craft apprentices nationally.
Ongoing	TU Dublin continues to sponsor 12 women each year to participate in the <u>Aurora Leadership Programme</u>
Ongoing	TU Dublin Childcare Assistance Fund is available to support students who are parents with childcare expenses using the
	childcare services at our on-campus crèche while studying at TU Dublin.
Ongoing	The TU Dublin Maternity Leave policy was revised in relation to terminating additional maternity leave due to sickness.
Ongoing	The TU Dublin Paternity Leave policy was updated to allow each parent five weeks leave for children born or adopted
	on or after 1st November 2019 to be taken during the first two years of a child's life.
Ongoing	TU Dublin Carers' Leave policy entitles a staff member to take unpaid leave from the University to enable them to
	provide full-time care and attention for a relevant person in need of such care.



Ongoing	The <u>TU Dublin Dignity &amp; Respect at Work policy</u> was revised to a pan-University policy ensuring that staff could work and learn in a positive and safe environment free from bullying and harassment across all campuses.



	sustainability journey started with an effort to boost morale at his fire station, where he introduced energy-saving
	initiatives to give the crew a sense of purpose and community.
October 2022	TU Dublin's Annual Report (pg. 37) featured TU Dublin's collaboration in the development of a District Heating System
	at its Tallaght campus. District heating is a network of highly insulated pipes that delivers low-carbon heat from a
	central energy source to provide space heating and hot water to the buildings connected to the network.
October 2022	TU Dublin and Geological Surveys Ireland (GSI) embarked on an exploratory project to drill the first urban geothermal
	test hole in Ireland. TU Dublin's Annual Report (p. 37) highlighted that the results indicated the geothermal test hole
	held real potential in this area. The next step is to plan for the construction of Ireland's first Geothermal District heating
	system in Grangegorman.
March 2022	TU Dublin's Sustainability Statement was approved by the University in March. Climate Action and reducing our
	greenhouse gas emissions forms one of the three key pillars in which the University commits to exploring renewable
	energy sources and reducing campus energy consumption.
March 2022	During TU Dublin Green Week, various seminars, workshops, films and talks were held, exploring various topics related

Ongoing	TU Dublin Statement on Fossil Fuels commits to investing in climate solutions, such as renewable energy, energy
	efficiency, sustainable agriculture, water efficiency. It also commits to selling any existing investments tied to these oil,

<u>SellSTEM - Spatially Enhanced Learning Linked to STEM</u> - is a Marie Skłodowska-Curie Innovative Training Network
investigating the role of spatial ability in and for STEM learning. The team consists of 15 PhD students, their supervisors
from 10 universities in Europe and 8 partners that host the students on secondment. The project runs from January
2021 for 48 months and is coordinated by TU Dublin.
