
Speaker Profiles

Glenn Hingerty lectures in Transportation Planning, Engineering and Design at the TU Dublin School of Transport and Civil Engineering. He is Co-Chairperson of the MSc in Sustainable Transport and Mobility. Glenn is a Chartered Civil Engineer with Engineers Ireland, a Chartered Transport Planning Professional with CIHT and a practicing Transport Infrastructure Ireland approved Road Safety Auditor. He is passionate about promoting transport planning and the design and creation of sustainable, equitable, safe and inclusive transport

systems in both urban and rural areas.



Kate Pangbourne is Professor of Transport Transitions at the Institute for Transport Studies, University of Leeds. Kate is an interdisciplinary researcher with an academic background spanning social and environmental sciences, humanities and computer science. Kate's work on transport governance and smart mobility investigates the power relations, structures, scales and processes involved in strategic vision and implementation of transport policies, drawing on notions of state (spatial) projects, multi-level governance, socio-technical transitions and collaborative advantage. Her work on

behaviour change engages with behavioural science, persuasion and mobile technologies. Kate is currently the Governance Theme Lead for the multi-institution Energy Demand Research Centre, co-lead of the ITS Social and Political Sciences Research Group and Deputy Director of the Leeds Social Sciences Institute.



Michelle Moore is undertaking an M.Phil. in Housing, evaluating the adaption potential of suburban housing for Ireland's ageing population. She is co-founder of Ava Housing, a social enterprise that is developing a new housing adaptation model for older homeowners who wish to remain living in their homes and communities. A chartered accountant, Michelle previously worked in financial services, serving as CEO of international insurance companies. She currently serves as non-executive director on the boards of a number of insurers.

As Head of Teaching and Learning in the Faculty, he has led curriculum development, programme design and validation at university level, ensuring high-quality and forward-looking provision. He brings strong expertise in academic leadership, quality assurance, and international collaboration, coupled with a proven commitment to equity, diversity and inclusion.



Dr Sarah Rock lectures in transport and urban design at the School of Architecture, Building and Environment, TU Dublin. Sarah has over 20 years' experience encompassing urban design, urban and transport planning, heritage conservation, research and education. Sarah has been leading TU Dublin's research on the socio-economic and mobility impacts of Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council's 'Covid Mobility and Public Realm Works' programme since 2020, focusing on the reallocation of road-space to public realm and active travel infrastructure in Blackrock, Dundrum and along

the Coastal Mobility Route. She is also co-investigator on RSA/Gol's Action 44 of the Road Safety Strategy, and is lead researcher on a Town Centre First study on the socio-economic role of road space (re)allocation in urban regeneration.

The MSc in Sustainable Transport & Mobility (TU226) at TU Dublin

The MSc in Sustainable Transport & Mobility at Technological University Dublin (TU Dublin) is a part-time, two-year postgraduate programme, delivered jointly at the TU Dublin School. of. Architecture? Building. and. Environment. (SABE) and the School. of. Transport.and.Civil.Engineering.(STCE).

Active travel, behavioural change and sustainable mobility are key themes of the programme, which seeks to prepare and equip graduates to take active and leadership roles in the transition towards a sustainable mobility future. The programme includes a summer school, an international field trip option, opportunities for individual research and new content in planning and design for active travel.

The programme is approved, by the Professional Standards Committee of the Chartered Institute of Highways and Transportation and the Transport Planning Society, as meeting the educational requirements for the Chartered Transport Planning Professional (CTPP) qualification. The programme has been running successfully since 2019 and has received positive feedback from current students and recent graduates alike.

Lectures take place in a blended format, to suit working professionals, with a mixture of online and face-to-face delivery. Sessions are predominantly during afternoons and evenings, with some modules delivered in block format. The next intake will be in January 2026. Applications can be made until 28th November 2025.

The MSc in Urban Regeneration and Development (TU228) at TU Dublin

The MSc.in.Urban.Regeneration.and.Development at TU Dublin is a part-time, two-year postgraduate programme designed to suit working professionals who are seeking a specialised understanding of the processes of urban regeneration and development. The programme is delivered at the TU Dublin School of Architecture, Building and Environment.

The programme equips students with the knowledge and tools to reflect on the contemporary challenges facing our city, town and village centres and to contribute towards the renewal of underutilised spaces.

The programme appeals especially to built environment (including design, planning, property, community and other) practitioners who wish to broaden their ability to understand and manage the processes and products of urban regeneration and development.

Lectures take place on-campus at TU Dublin Bolton Street and Grangegorman, with some blended and online content also included. Sessions are predominantly during afternoons and evenings, with some modules delivered in block format. The next intake will be in January 2026. Applications can be made until 28th November 2025.
